Why don't you tell the United States to 'get over' 9/11? Why don't you tell this country to 'get over' all the veterans who died in the Second World War, instead of honouring them once a year?

We should never forget, even once they have learned from it, because it's part of who we are. It's not just a part of who we are as survivors and children of survivors and relatives of survivors, it's part of who we are as a nation. And this nation must never forget what it once did to its most vulnerable people."

They took our land, water, trees and animals too,

Now they want our children, them, me and even you!

So we fought, until we couldn't anymore.

We fought, like we hadn't before.

It's 2021

Mi'kiju' is wise and old now, it's almost her time to go, as we sit with her and remember how far we've come with the men we used to run from,

she looks to me and says,

"Remember the ground and the trees Tu's,

"Remember the drumming and the river,

"Don't forget the stories and the words Tu's,

"Don't forget the legends that make your bones shiver.

"I'm going with your sister, to see where the sun shines,

"Take your Tu's, it's time to show her what we won't and will allow,

"But most importantly, it's finally time to go and play now."

Why do we have Orange Shirt Day?

September 30th is National Truth and Reconciliation Day in recognition of the harm the residential school system did to children's sense of self-esteem and well being, and as an affirmation of our commitment to ensure that everyone around us matters.

The following is an excerpt from Phyllis Jack. It was her orange shirt that is one of the reasons for National Truth and Reconciliation Day.

"I went to the Mission for one school year in 1973/1974. I had just turned 6 years old. I lived with my grandmother on the Dog Creek reserve. We never had very much money, but somehow my granny managed to buy me a new outfit to go to the Mission school. I remember going to Robinson's store and picking out a shiny orange shirt. It had string laced up in front, and was so bright and exciting just like I felt to be going to school!

"When I got to the Mission, they stripped me, and took away my clothes, including the orange shirt! I never wore it again. I didn't understand why they wouldn't give it back to me, it was mine! The color orange has always reminded me of that and how my feelings didn't matter, how no one cared and how I felt like I was worth nothing. All of us little children were crying and no one cared."

Phyllis struggled for many years because of the hurt she experienced with her orange shirt at residential school. She is better now as she continues on her healing journey. We are reminded on Orange Shirt Day that every child matters.
